

Our next club meeting is on 14th April 2023 and the main feature will be a "Round-the-table" member discussion on money-saving aquarium hacks.




General Husbandry

Field Trip Files: Werribee River 4th March 2023


Club meeting details and key contacts

The Flathead Galaxias is number 3 on "The Magnificent six" (a list of threatened floodplain specialist fish species in the Murray Corridor) to be targeted for conservation efforts by Middle Creek Farm with oversight by Peter Rose of North Central Catchment Management Authority and the help of Native Fish Australia and ANGFA Vic. As you all know there has been great success with the Murray Darling Southern Pygmy Perch and Vic population Southern Purple-spotted Gudgeon. Who knows what is possible next!

Welcome to VICNews 128! At our club meeting of 3rd February, Dr Dion Iervasi gave a fantastic presentation on the recent blackwater fish rescues undertaken in northern Victoria. Dr Dion also touched on the thought-provoking idea of using irrigation channels as native fish population havens.

On Saturday 4th of March, ANGFA members visited Riverbend Historical Park

in Werribee to look for fishes at the Southern Diversion weir. See pictorial article on page 4.

Our next field trip. Over the weekend of the 22nd and 23rd April, there is an opportunity for ANGFA Vic members to be involved in some citizen science: undertaking eDNA sampling for Flathead Galaxias in the upper Goulburn River catchment. 




